There Is No Backup Plan

Our youngest son applied to a college.
That's right, just one.

After extensive research across the globe considering vastly different schools and programs from California to Florida, America to Australia, only one stood out to him. So, he invested significant time in completing an extensive application, audition (including the writing and performing of at least three original songs), and interview process.

In my sharing of his journey with others, people often ask, "Where else has he applied?" or, even more directly, "What's his backup plan?"

An engineer by training and early career, I am not only a big fan of redundancy, I typically design for it. All 66 projects I worked on as an engineer included a series of redundancies built into the primary designs, as well outright backup plans for construction, use, and in case of possible failure.

I have seen too many things collapse, too many surprises upset very thorough and well-intentioned plans, and too many "sure things" turn into broken and shattered dreams.

Most of my forethoughts of actions and adventures – sometimes moments, but often days, weeks, even years in the works – include a backup plan. I may not write every plan out, or broadcast my dispositions, but my mind rehearses options and scenarios keyed to potential triggers.

So, I ponder the wisdom of anyone proceeding with anything with no backup plan.

However, in my pondering, I am struck by the reality that in the biggest and most important things in my life – specifically my life and my everlasting soul – I have no backup plan.

I have cast my lot – all that I have, all that I am, and all that I ever hope to be, both now and forevermore – with Jesus Christ, and with Jesus Christ alone.

I am trusting that He is the Way, the truth, and the life, and apart from Him, there is no other.

In life and in death, if the Jewish and Christian scriptural promises are not true, I have no supplementary options on the table, or waiting for me out back, or buried or locked away somewhere that I can access in an emergency. I have no additional lifelines or phone-a-friends, no other "Get out of Hell Free" cards, no magic mirrors or escape portals or reset buttons or time machines.

I don't have a list of other religions to run to if Christianity doesn't work out.

I am not secretly banking on an underlying Godless reality of meaninglessness temporal existence and random chance.

I am not presuming an impersonal fundamental materiality of eternal oneness and unity.

I am not supposing a rationally enlightened allegiance to a future nothingness.

I am not expecting an anonymous continuance or terminus devoid of justice, righteous punishments, and gracious rewards.

I am not casting my hopes in prevailing victoriously over and through a maze of emotional, intellectual, moral, physical, and political battles in a worldly survival of the fittest contest.

I am not trusting my future hopes in a promising pastor, politician, priest, or professional; a particular program, prosperous possessions, or perceived power; or my ability to produce plentiful points on the scoreboard of life.

I am not hoping to one day brilliantly figure everything out and have all my intelligent (and foolish) questions answered so I can then – knowing all things there are to be known – make a completely informed and rational decision that requires absolutely zero faith.

No, I only have one plan – trust in Jesus Christ.

There is no backup plan.

Getting Our Hands **Dirty**

The word “apprenticeship” typically conjures images of silversmiths, dusty workshops, and bustling colonial streets. To a typical 21st century mind, the model of apprenticeship-style education has grown to be a rather quaint, and if one is honest, antiquated method of learning a trade.

At TBS, however, we embrace this particular antiquity.

“For thousands of years, in every culture and every nation, the primary method of teaching and learning knowledge, skills, tasks, and trades has been through apprenticeship,” notes Dr. K Lynn Lewis, President of The Bible Seminary. “Learners spend time with experts listening and watching, doing together, and gaining proficiency under tutelage over time.”

It makes sense that the TBS Master of Divinity program employs an apprenticeship model that has produced centuries of people equipped to flourish in various trades.

However, welcoming antiquity does not preclude utilizing contemporary elements. For instance, TBS is not a computer-free zone. We enjoy the blessings of technology, and encourage its use, as evidenced by the fact that every TBS Master of Divinity student typically receives a free Logos

Bible Software package with more than 1,900 digital books and resources as part of their degree program.

One strength of apprenticeship-style education is relational discipleship. Gaining hands-on experience in the field while rubbing elbows with seasoned veterans has proven to work quite well throughout history, and we continue to utilize that “teaching by doing” model in a variety of ways.

A foundational component of our program is the Spiritual Formation and Ministry classes. Students typically take one each semester, for a total of six during the degree program, and are required to engage in a minimum of five hours of ministry service per week as part of the classes. Engaging with other

students and leaders in processing their ministry service is a key part of the classes.

According to Dr. Jim Leggett, founding President of TBS, “We believe that doing ministry, while learning about doing ministry, remains the best method of education.”

As to what ministries students engage in, the possibilities are almost endless. Many students already hold full or part-time ministry positions that count for their requirement.

"I don't have to put my notes in a box and wait six years until I become a pastor," first year M. Div. student and youth pastor at Longpoint Baptist Church, Kevin Alvarez says, reflecting on all the times he has given sermons and presentations in class.

"As pastors, we have to speak a lot. We have these ideas and illustrations that may not go so well. It's kind of a trial and error thing. I get to try something and if it fails, it's just in front of my class."

Beyond all the opportunities to speak publicly, fellow M. Div. student and youth director Sara Stanley holds that even the material she reads in her books, hears in lectures and absorbs from other student's presentations takes on a whole new light because she is reading and listening with specific peoples' faces in mind.

"Reading this book *Move* has really got me thinking about how better to disciple my students," she says. "And not because I necessarily want to do it the way *Move* says, but all semester I've been thinking how can I apply what my fellow classmates are saying and what the Holy Spirit is impressing upon my heart to shape and disciple these students."

"I wouldn't have to answer that question in real time if I wasn't doing ministry and in school," she continues. "I could think to myself maybe in five years I'll make a plan, but instead, no, in five minutes I need to make a plan because tonight I'm going to my Wednesday program."

Doing ministry while studying ministry also helps students ask questions that are less theoretical and more practical.

"With our Biblical counseling class, people are coming up with examples of 'What if this would happen?'" Alvarez says. "But, I have examples that are going on right now. So if this is going on, its real life to me, it is not something in a book or a textbook. It is real life, and I get to apply it right now."

During the most recent spring semester, Master of Divinity students were engaged in impacting nearly 2,000 people directly, and thousands more indirectly, through 14 different ministries every week.

"What we teach and students learn during weekdays," says Dr. Lewis, "often shows up in sermons and ministry activities on the weekends. And then, we talk about those things in classes the next week. This happens week after week in such a way that seminary – in association with numerous other ministries in this community – is a practical laboratory of learning."

Alvarez appreciates that the wisdom he gleans in classes comes from both professors and other students. In classes of ranging in size from 8 to 16 students aged 22 to 56 from a variety of denominational, ethnic, experiential, and social backgrounds, as well as nationalities, he believes face-to-face interactions have proven invaluable.

"The tuition that you pay could just be for the interactions," he says. "You can't learn that from a book. You can read all these different books, but Paul went and saw me teach. Lynn takes the time to take me out to lunch. It's more than just the education part, it's the relationships."

The teaching by doing model extends beyond conversations with peers and mentors about ministry to one's own relationship with God. There comes a time in doing and studying ministry to pause, reflect and rest in God's presence. So, at TBS, students learn to rest by actually doing it.

"I used the solitude when we went on the retreat," Alvarez says, thinking back to the Spiritual Formation and Ministry III overnight retreat to the Cennacle Retreat House in Houston. "It felt like 2 or 3 days being in solitude. Even with some of the spiritual disciplines, being in ministry, you would think that you would already have it under your belt. But, you're surprised to find that you have a long way to go."

Like any good apprenticeship, transformation happens inside the apprentice. TBS "apprentices" are encouraged to gain both hands-on skills needed to succeed in their "trade", as well as the Master's touch with evidence of His hand working to craft and shape their lives.

"I am very program and event-driven as a youth pastor," Stanley says. "But, I haven't always been great at taking time to spend with God and God's Word to let that be the design for our program. Seminary forced me to pause, enjoy studying the Bible, and do what we should be doing as youth pastors, but rarely do because we're so focused on deadlines and things."

"I was a youth pastor before I ever started seminary, but the difference now is monumental," she continues. "Even in the book *Move*, the way you grow your program is not the program itself, but it is having leaders who are sold out for Jesus...seminary has sold me out for Jesus because now I understand."

TBS Professor Named Dig Director

The dig site at Khirbet el Maqatir is producing rumblings throughout the archaeological world, and TBS Church History professor Dr. Scott Stripling has the privilege of being right at the epicentre of the activity.

Stripling was recently named the Dig Director of the site at Khirbet el Maqatir, believed to be the site of the biblical city of Ai in Joshua 7-8. Having spent the past few seasons as a field supervisor at the site, Stripling accepted the Dig Director position at Khirbet el-Maqatir. Prior to joining the Associates of Biblical Research (ABR) staff, which has overseen excavations at Khirbet el-Maqatir since 1995, Stripling served as an ABR associate for three years, a field supervisor at Tal el-Hammam in Jordan for five seasons, and a supervisor at the Temple Mount Salvage Operation in Jerusalem for two seasons.

Stripling assumed the leadership role at Khirbet el-Maqatir shortly before the Israeli Antiquities Authority declared the dig one of the largest in Israel with over 70 workers during its most recent excavation from late May through early June of 2014.

In 2013, a rare Egyptian scarab was unearthed at Khirbet el-Maqatir, and *Christianity Today* voted the scarab the top archaeological discovery of 2013. Stripling's team discovered a similar scarab during the most recent excavation earlier this summer along with 311 coins, far more than previous seasons have produced. With the Bible's accuracy called into question based on a previously suggested site for Ai that does not align with the biblical text, these discoveries help validate the historical integrity of the Bible.



In addition to making discoveries that help prove Khirbet el-Maqatir to be Joshua's Ai, Stripling's team uncovered the remains of a New Testament village that may be the Ephraim referred to in John 11:54.


These, among other discoveries, garnered a whirlwind of attention for ABR's dig, including requests for interviews and article submissions from *Artifax* magazine and the most prominent journal published in Hebrew.

"It seems as if everyone in Israel is talking about our dig!" Stripling says.

TBS Professors, Students partake in Archaeology Symposium

TBS faculty and students took a field trip last semester to Houston Baptist University where they heard TBS Church History Professor Dr. Scott Stripling give a lecture entitled "Ritual Purity at Khirbet el-Maqatir's First Century Village and First Jewish Revolt against Rome." Along with his fellow lecturers from the Associates of Biblical Research, Stripling helped listeners



understand how recent discoveries provide pivotal evidence pointing to Khirbet el-Maqatir being the site of biblical Ai in Joshua 7-8. Moreover, this evidence helps prove the reliability of the Bible as archaeology backs up what is seen in Scripture.

Stripling's lecture closed out a symposium in celebration of the exhibit at HBU's Dunham Bible Museum called "Khirbet



el-Maqatir: History of a Biblical Site." The exhibit features a number of artifacts from recent archaeological digs at Khirbet el-Maqatir, including an Egyptian scarab voted the top archaeological find of 2013 by *Christianity Today*.

Those interested can view the exhibit at the Dunham Bible Museum until December 2014 when the exhibit will be relocated to Five Points Museum in Cleveland, Tennessee.



The glory of God was tangible in the dimly lit sanctuary, as a group of worshipers and prayer warriors focused all their attention on our Holy God, our Audience of One.

While the worship and prayer leaders led from the stage, others sat quietly in chairs reading Scripture or writing in journals, while others sang and worshiped along.

One woman sat at the altar, covered in a prayer shawl, interceding for those around her. Another paced the outside aisles, pleading on behalf of the nations. With closed eyes and outstretched arms, some pondered the treasures of God in their hearts. "Holy is the Lord God Almighty!" the prayer leader rang out, as many of the worshipers agreed with claps of joy.

Twenty-four hours into the city of Katy's three-day, 24/7, fifty-hour non-stop worship and prayer service, the worshipers in the room remained focused on only Jesus.

For the third year in a row, this dynamic event called "Fire on the Altar" was held the last weekend in May. The purpose is simple yet profound: To establish 24/7 worship and prayer in West Houston and Katy, fueled by united worshipers of Jesus from every denomination and background.

This type of event is not a modern concept, as three-thousand years ago King David, as an outflow of his heart, commanded that the Ark of the covenant be brought into Jerusalem upon the shoulders of the Levites amidst the sounds of songs and musical instruments. He placed it in a tent, and appointed two hundred and eighty-eight prophetic singers and four thousand musicians to minister before the Lord, "to make petition, to give thanks and to praise the Lord" day and night (1 Chronicles 16:4). This was unlike anything that had been done in Israel's history, but it was God's plan. According to the official Fire on the Altar website, this order of worship has been embraced and instituted throughout the history of God's people ever since. Each time it is reintroduced, spiritual breakthrough, deliverance and victory follows.

Following David's model, fifty area churches and ministries partnered together this year for Fire on the Altar.

"Churches from different denominations and cultural backgrounds all joined together in one accord, sustaining fifty hours of non-stop prayer and worship," said Erica McLemore,

Administrator of Audience of One at the Great Southwest Prayer Center in Katy, Texas.

"We're really growing. Its like somebody poured water on a weed," said J.M. Mercado, Music Director at Epiphany of the Lord Catholic Community, reflecting on how God continues to bless Fire on the Altar. "People need to know that we can hold prayers like this, not minding the denomination."

Instead of being a stand alone event as in the past 2 years, this year's Fire on the Altar kicked off at the National Day of Prayer gathering at the Merrill center on Thursday, May 1st, with worship led by the nationally known Christian artists "The Afters". The event called "National Day of Prayer Ignites Fire on the Altar" then moved to the Great Southwest Prayer Center and continued until 9:00 pm Saturday, May 3rd.

As seen in David's model, this is no easy task to undertake. Sustaining just fifty hours of worship required between sixty and one hundred worship leaders, prayer leaders and audio/visual leaders. Each team consisted of 3 or more people and was required to undergo training includes not only on the Audience of One model, but also on the history of the Katy prayer movement as well as operational instructions such as transitioning on and off the stage, meeting prior to the set and an after set de-brief.

Having participated in Fire on the Altar in 2013, Mercado knew the experience was worth the work for his team of 10 musicians and prayer leaders that included his wife.

"Fire on the Altar sparked something in their hearts that was lacking," Mercado says. "My wife sometimes wanted to cry. Throughout the set, a lot of the ladies are crying. It's not performing; it's being used by the Holy Spirit.

"We sang through here," he whispered, pointing at his chest. "Not technical. Through the heart."

Fire on the Altar was birthed three years ago out of a vision given to Stephanie Leggett, a member and youth volunteer at Grace Fellowship United Methodist



Church. She says that in August of 2010, she cried out to God in frustration after several attempts to take a group of youth to the International House of Prayer (IHOP) in Kansas City has fallen apart. Leggett had visited IHOP several times, was moved by the 24/7 prayer and worship movement God has raised up there, and was eager for the youth of Katy to plug into what she saw God doing.

Leggett expressed her frustration to a youth ministry assistant, who replied, "Why don't you do a big worship thing right here?"

"I suppose it was a vision because in that instant I knew it would be three days, and I knew it would be where we were standing in the Epi (Grace Fellowship Youth Center), and I knew it would be a partnership with churches from around the community," Leggett said. She questioned God, who she believes encouraged what she was feeling as she felt He said, "You can only take them to Kansas twelve at a time. I want hundreds."

The idea for the event was then brainstormed by Leggett and Prayer Pastor Brenda Martin, along with prayer staff and various community church leaders, and was birthed as an all-aged, multi-denominational, and cross-cultural prayer and worship event.

Fire on the Altar has seen tremendous growth since its inception in 2012. That year, worship and prayer teams came from seventeen area churches and ministries. A team from The International House of Prayer came to Katy to train the teams on what 24/7 focused prayer and worship looks like. In 2013, God raised up twenty-seven different churches and ministries to sustain the three-day Fire on the Altar.

McLemore explains, "That year (2013) we felt the Lord calling us to pray for jubilee, restoration and revival. We have seen the effects of last year's prayers this year, as many people are giving testimonies of jubilee."

For example, she says she has seen marriages restored, as well as physical and emotional healings.

This year's event was different than previous years in that FOTA partnered with Christian radio station KSBJ, who heard of what God was doing in Katy and wanted to get on board. In addition, instead of having to spread the word to area churches and ministries to gather worshipers, area churches and ministries are asking how to join in on what God is already doing at the Great Southwest Prayer Center (GSPC).

The prayer movement in Katy has been underway for nearly eighteen years, birthed after Dr. Charles Wisdom returned from a Promise Keeper's conference to unite the pastor's of Katy in prayer. To this day the gathering has grown, as many area pastors and ministry leaders continue to meet weekly to lift the city and her people in prayer in the Katy Prayer Room, which was consecrated in 2005.

The first Audience of One sets at The Great Southwest Prayer Center came after a visit to IHOP by Pastor Jim Leggett, who caught the vision of the 24/7 prayer model and the dream to create a space for it to happen. Interestingly, the first two-hour set was actually already happening in the main sanctuary. The GSPC opened its doors in 2007, and the prayer movement has grown from those two hours a week to approximately one hundred and forty hours a month. With this, the vision to sustain 24/7 prayer and worship in the city of Katy at GSPC is coming to pass, just as was prophesied in 2007 by James Edward of the Beth El Prayer Room in Bethlehem.

"Each year, at the end of Fire on the Altar, we hear people say we need to do this more often. They have no idea God is already doing this here in the city!" said McLemore.



Preparing for the Journey

In preparation for taking TBS students, faculty, and others on Holy Land study tours, Dr. and Mrs. Lewis were able to enjoy a quick, 8-day GTI Tours preview trip with more than 50 ministry leaders from across the U.S. who traveled to Israel this past January. Although their group spent less time and moved much faster than the planned TBS trips (of 11 days and 60+ locations), they were able to visit many sites and engage in significant planning for TBS tours.

"A major impact of our trip," notes Dr. Lewis, "is how it has impacted the way I read Scripture now. The text is much more dimensional. I can see, hear, smell, feel, even taste things in places named in the passages. Also, even small and seemingly insignificant words in Scripture really do have meaning. For example, in the first chapter of the Gospel of Mark, after Jesus healed a man in the Capernaum synagogue, he went with several disciples to Simon Peter's house and healed Simon's mother-in-law from a fever. 




Meet our newest board member

The Prayer Pastor at Faithbridge United Methodist Church (UMC) in Spring, Texas, Dr. Teykl is an ordained elder in the Texas Conference of the UMC since 1978. He has served as pastor of several churches, including Founding Pastor of Aldersgate UMC from 1979 to 1995. Under his leadership, Aldersgate grew from 8 to 2000 in attendance and led the conference in Professions of Faith for ten years and received several awards for evangelism. He founded Renewal Ministries in 1984 to help bring spiritual renewal to the United Methodist Church. Since 1995, he has engaged in a worldwide ministry of teaching and preaching on prayer-evangelism; conducted hundreds of seminars for local churches, Districts and Conferences of the United Methodist Church; teacher in other denominations, Bible schools, and seminaries; preacher in several lectureships across the Globe. He and wife, Kathleen – a practicing psychotherapist in Houston, Texas – have been married since 1964 and have two sons, two daughters, and 8 grandchildren.

Painted Lines

During a recent long layover between flights in Salt Lake City, our family took a free shuttle downtown and visited Temple Square. While touring the Salt Lake Assembly Hall and Salt Lake Tabernacle, our two young tour guides mentioned that the original benches, as well as the columns supporting the balconies, were crafted from native spruce that the early pioneers found in the area.

However, because the Mormons wanted to “give their best to the Lord”, they hand painted grain on the benches to look like oak, and hand painted the pillars to resemble marble.

Although the facilities were beautiful and the workmanship fairly exquisite, ironically, this seemed like a parable of attempts by some to create their own religion, write their own testaments, redefine commandments, and recast denominations in their own image – all the while claiming that the authority of God, Scripture, the church, and support by influential leaders – pastors, prophets, even angels – gives them credibility.

Just like varnishing spruce and painting lines on it to look like oak, people throughout history have tried to present faux, or false, forms of godliness (II Timothy 3:5) in order to look like “the real thing”, the good stuff, the best.

Meanwhile, God claims He is wearied by those who say, “All who do evil are good in the eyes of the Lord, and he is pleased with them” (Malachi 2:17).

Isaiah specifically cautioned against calling evil good and good evil (Isaiah 5:20).

Jesus warned that “many will turn away from the faith and will betray and hate each other, and many false prophets will appear and deceive many people. Because of the increase in wickedness, the love of most will grow cold, but he

who stands firm to the end will be saved” (Matthew 24:10-12).

Paul instructed Timothy to “Preach the Word; be prepared in season and out of season; correct, rebuke and encourage – with great patience and careful instruction. For the time will come when men will not put up with sound doctrine. Instead, to suit their own desires, they will gather around them a great number of teachers to say what

their itching ears want to hear. They will turn aside from the truth and turn aside to myths” (II Timothy 4:2-4).

Peter warned about false prophets and teachers who mouth empty, boastful words and entice people by appealing to the lustful desires of sinful human nature and promise freedom – while they themselves are slaves of depravity (2 Peter 2:1-19).

At The Bible Seminary the Gospel begins with “Repent!” not “Repaint!”

Such behavior is as rampant today as it has ever been, but it is nothing new.

What fascinates me is that those who refute authority, the Lord, Scripture, and authentic orthodox Christian denominational doctrines, need those things to legitimize themselves. But, since they don’t agree with them, they have to

hijack or kidnap them, strip them down or replace them, keep the outward forms, and then varnish and repaint them to appear like something that they are not.

Thankfully, at The Bible Seminary, the Gospel begins with “Repent!” not “Repaint!”

We rely wholly on God’s Presence and power, not our performance and persistence.

Our questions and studies and service revolve around what the Bible actually says and what it means for life and in ministry. We accept its authority in its entirety, even if it makes us uncomfortable or we don’t fully understand it.

We truly believe the Lord and His Word are the real thing, and we invite you to join us in seeking repentance, conversion and sanctification; in building up His church, not ours; in training passionate disciples, not pious scholars; in sending out sentinels, not swindlers, truth tellers, not storytellers; and in seeking all truth and glory in Jesus Christ, not in painted lines, faux marble, or human-centered religiosity.

The Bible Seminary exists to glorify God by training Christian believers in a context of biblical community in all 66 books of the Bible so that they can serve the local church and fulfill the Great Commission by the power of God’s Spirit.



Financial Update

The Bible Seminary's past fiscal year ended May 31, 2014 with total income of \$651,584 – including \$367,631 in donations – and total expenses of \$805,356. Although we spent conservatively \$163,384 below budget, we still needed to withdraw \$153,772 from the 2010-11 capital campaign cash reserves, which currently total \$425,000.

We added 6 new Master of Divinity (MDiv) students during 2013-14, which was lower than expectations. So, we controlled expenses by reducing the impact of lower than estimated tuition and fee income and delaying the first Holy Land trip until January 2015. Enrollment in Bible Certificate classes remained strong.

We were able to grant more student scholarships than estimated due to individuals contributing to the Student Scholarship Fund. Those contributions are included in our Donor Contributions income.

Payroll expenses continue to be reduced by depending on a growing group of volunteers.

Our current 2014-15 fiscal year will represent several challenges. We plan to fully engage in the accreditation process with the Transnational Association of Christian Colleges and Schools (TRACS), which will include expenses for TRACS application and annual fees, additional TBS staffing, and expenses related to accreditation team visits. We are also expanding MDiv class offerings, and taking our first group Holy Land Trip.

With all of these added costs, for the first time in our history, our estimated annual budget will exceed \$1 million. Obviously, we continue to trust God to send more students and provide continuing and increasing donor support to help firmly establish and fund the mission of The Bible Seminary, including reaching 1 million souls for Christ through the ministries of TBS graduates.



Our Core Values



Lordship – Because He is Lord (Philippians 2:11), we will continually ask Jesus Christ to sit on the throne of the seminary and on the throne of the lives of its faculty, administrators, and students for the glory of God (1 Corinthians 10:31).



Bible – Because the Bible is the fully true Word of God (2 Timothy 3:16), we will offer and require the study of all 66 books of the Bible before graduation with a degree. We will seek to creatively integrate classical theological disciplines and ministry training by studying books of the Bible (i.e. Church History will begin with the Book of Acts and keep going; Pastoral Leadership will come through the study of the Pastoral Epistles; Systematic Theology will flow out of the study of the Pauline Epistles)



Prayer – Because apart from Him we can do nothing (John 15:5), we will continually seek to plug into the Vine Jesus Christ through yielding to Him in prayer. We will offer a unique emphasis on prayer including classes on prayer, a school of prayer, prayer faculty, and multiple prayer opportunities in the life of the seminary.



Unreached Peoples – Because the return of Christ awaits the evangelization of all people groups (Matthew 24:14), we will keep our eyes on the unreached peoples of the world and train our students to have a heart for the fulfillment of the Great Commission (Matthew 28:18-20) by seeking to reach millions of souls for Jesus Christ.



Local Church – Because the local church is God's plan (Matthew 16:18), we will be based at a local church and have a symbiotic relationship of service and training including internships, volunteerism, and prayer/worship opportunities.



Community – Because we were created for community (Genesis 1:26; Romans 12:5). We will seek to build a campus-based fellowship where the "one anothers" of Scripture are lived out, where authenticity and accountability are practiced, and where integrity is modeled and taught.



Compassion – Because God has a huge heart for the poor and overlooked (Matthew 25:31-46), we will strive to motivate, equip, and train students to minister to "the least of these" as a lifestyle.
